WOOD BADGE

Ticket

The primary purpose of the Wood Badge experience is to strengthen Scouting in our units, districts, and councils. The Wood Badge "ticket" represents your commitment to complete a set of personal goals relating to your Scouting Position. These goals will significantly strengthen the program in which you are involved. In addition, the ticket gives you an opportunity to practice and demonstrate a working knowledge of the leadership skills represented during the course.

You will have up to 18 months to complete those goals. A counselor will be assigned to you to provide guidance and encouragement as you complete your ticket.

Recognition

Upon completion of your Wood Badge ticket, as certified by your counselor and Scout Executive, you will be presented with your Wood Badge certificate, neckerchief, woggle, and beads at an appropriate public ceremony

WHAT ELSE DO I NEED TO KNOW?

- In order to graduate, you must attend and participate in all sessions of either course, including both weekends and several meetings between the course weekends. It is not possible to take one weekend in the spring course and one in the fall.
 - Official B.S.A. uniform, including shirt, pants, socks, and belt are to be worn throughout the course. You probably already have these for your position!

WHAT IS WOOD BADGE?

Wood Badge is the advanced Scout leader training course. Begun in 1919 by Lord Baden-Powell, founder of Scouting and Wood Badge's first director, it came to America in 1948. Continually updated to reflect the current BSA policies and programs, incorporate the latest material and utilize the best techniques available, Wood Badge has become the most advanced leadership training course in Scouting! In this course, Scouters learn practical leadership skills in a lecture-practice format. The skills taught are applicable to every leader and provide a common foundation for Cub Scout, Boy Scout, and Venture programs. The first part of the course utilizes a classroom environment and practical exercises to teach the essentials of leadership. You'll learn what makes leadership "work," and how to make it work for you and in your unit. Later, a combination of classroom and outdoor settings help you learn to apply those skills to make you function better as a leader and your unit function more effectively as a team. Finally, you will have an opportunity to state your goals as a leader and put into motion a plan to achieve those goals.

WHAT IS THE COST?

The course fee is \$200.00. (\$100 deposit required). Refunds only made if spot can be filled. The fee covers meals, all equipment and course materials. Training Scholarships available upon request

WHO CAN ATTEND?

Any registered Scouter who has completed basic training for their registered position. Even Scouters who have earned their Wood Badge prior to the Wood Badge for the 21st century can participate.

A standard class 3 medical exam must be completed prior to beginning the course, which will be sent to you as part of your registration packet.
