Opening - (What is Perseverance?) -

Ask people “What is perseverance?”

- Staying with the task and not giving up.
- Showing commitment, pride and a positive attitude in completing tasks.
- Trying again and again and again.
- Being patient and willing to work hard.

Can you name some people who have shown perseverance?

- Lance Armstrong, Thomas Edison, Harriet Tubman, Helen Keller, Stevie Wonder, etc.

What are ways you can show perseverance?

- When you are near the end of race and struggling to finish, find a burst of energy to cross the finish line.
- Try a new sport or skill that is difficult and don't quit.
- Study and work hard to improve your grades.
- Save up your money and do extra chores to buy something special.
- Help a younger child learn to ride a bicycle or play a new game.
- Spend hours practicing to play an instrument.
- Always finish what you start. Do not give up when things get tough.
- Try something again, even if you failed the first time. Remember you had to learn to walk before you could run!

Games – (Mouse Trap Attack!, Icy Perseverance, Reach for the Stars)

Mouse Trap Attack!

Materials: 4 spring loaded mouse traps per team, An endless supply of rolled up paper balls

We will suppose that there are four teams or patrols of six boys. They are spaced at equal distances down the length of the hall. Each team or patrol has its mouse traps cocked at one side of the hall on the floor. At the other side of the hall opposite each group of mouse traps are three attacking boys from each of the other patrols. These attacking boys are armed with rolled up balls of paper. Each patrol is allowed up to three defenders for their mouse traps. These defenders must sit on the floor half way between their mouse traps and the defenders. The attackers must lob the paper balls over the heads of the defenders and set off the mouse traps. The winning patrol is the one that has the last loaded mouse trap.

Icy Perseverance

Materials: an ice cube for each student with a penny frozen inside.

Begin your lesson by giving each student an ice cube. Explain that the first person to get the penny out of their ice without putting it in their mouth or hitting it with another object is the winner. You may want to continue your lesson until you have a winner. Afterwards discuss:

- How does melting the ice cube compare to reaching your goals?
- Did you ever feel like quitting? Why do some people quit before reaching their goals?
- Could you have gotten the penny quicker had you broken the rules? Would you feel as good about winning if you didn't follow the rules?
- How do hard work and perseverance help you achieve your goals?

Reach for the Stars

Materials: Paper stars

Give each student a paper star. Have students write a dream or goal that they hope to achieve on their star and then decorate it. Tell the students that it takes perseverance to fulfill their dreams.

Crafts – Coffee Filter Parachute, Cub Scout Crossover

What you'll need:

- Coffee filter
- Yarn or string
- Hardware washer
- Markers
- Cellophane tape

How to make it:

- Draw and color a design on the large coffee filter
- Cut 4 pieces of yarn (or 2 long pieces)
- Tie pieces of yarn to washer
- Place 4 evenly spaced pieces cellophane tape on open portion of coffee filter and fold over tape onto the other end of the pieces of yarn.

Personalize your Crossover Cub and Boy Scout decorations with this fabulous two-step Popsicle stick craft.

What you'll need:

- Computer
- Printer
- Scanner (for the difficult version)
- Cardstock paper
- Scissors
- Glue
- 2 Identical school pictures or snapshots of each child (check size!)
- Paint program OR markers, crayons, or colored pencils
- 2 Popsicle sticks per child

How to make it:

Scout Friend - Easy: (Directions for one child)

- Print a sheet of Scout Friends on cardstock to use for the Scout friend.
- Cut out the Scout Friends and hats. (Note: You will be using the picture of the child's head for this project.)
- Cut 2 pieces of paper about 1" x 1 1/2" out of the cardstock. This will become the new stand.
- Let the boys color in with crayons, colored pencils, or markers a Cub Scout and a Boy Scout uniform, including the hats. Note: The Cub Scout Friend has the diamond shaped rank badges on the pocket.
- Lay one Scout face down on the table.
- Cover with a layer of glue.
- Take the piece of cardstock and fold in half (1" x 3/4"). Unfold. Place the cardstock at the feet of the friend with the fold facing up and at the bottom of the feet. Put some glue on the part of the card that is above the fold.
- Place one Popsicle stick down the middle of the Scout Friend. Be sure that the Popsicle stick will stick up above the neck so that the face can be glued on.
- Put glue on the back of the Popsicle stick.
- Place another stand on top of the Popsicle stick, lining it up with the stand below. This time the fold goes down. (This will enable the Scout Friend to stand.)
- Put some glue on the part of the card that is above the fold.
- Place the other Scout Friend face up, matching the sides, top and bottom of the first Scout Friend below. Press together.
- Let dry.

- Meantime, work on making your Crossover Bridge for your Scout Friend to stand on.
- Break a Popsicle stick to fit on the bottom of the stand. Glue in place. This gives the Scout Friend the ability to stand through the whole ceremony. (grin)
- Cut out the face of the child in the pictures.
- Glue a face to each side of the Scout Friend.
- Glue a hat (make sure you put the right hat on with the uniform!) on the child's head.
- Your Scout Friends are done!

Scout Friend - Difficult (on the computer):

- Go to this page and save a copy of the Scout Friends graphic on your hard drive.
- Open up the Scout Friends picture in your graphics program.
- Using your graphics program, color in one uniform as a blue Cub Scout uniform (it has the rank badges on the pocket) and the other uniform as a tan Boy Scout uniform.
- Save this graphic to disk.
- Scan the pictures of each of the children. Size the heads in the pictures to match the size of the Scout Friends. (Option: Print out the Scout Friend, cut out the actual picture of the child, and glue the head on the Scout Friend and add the hat.)
- Paste the head of a boy on BOTH the Cub Scout and the Boy Scout Friend.
- Position the hats on the head of each Scout Friend.
- Save this graphic under the child's name. (This is in case of printer malfunction!)
- Print out the new Cub and Boy Scout Friend on cardstock.
- Cut 2 pieces of paper about 1" x 1 1/2" out of the cardstock. This will become the new stand.
- Cut out each Scout Friend.
- Lay one Scout face down on the table.
- Cover with a layer of glue.
- Take the piece of cardstock and fold in half (1" x 3/4"). Unfold. Place the cardstock at the feet of the friend with the fold facing up and at the bottom of the feet. Put some glue on the part of the card that is above the fold.
- Place one Popsicle stick down the middle of the Scout Friend. Be sure that the Popsicle stick will stick up above the neck so that the face can be glued on.
- Put glue on the back of the Popsicle stick.
- Place another stand on top of the Popsicle stick, lining it up with the stand below. This time the fold goes down. (This will enable the Scout Friend to stand.)
- Put some glue on the part of the card that is above the fold.
- Place the other Scout Friend face up, matching the sides, top and bottom of the first Scout Friend below. Press together.
- Let dry.
- Meantime, work on making your Crossover Bridge for your Scout Friend to stand on.
- Break a Popsicle stick to fit on the bottom of the stand. Glue in place. This gives the Scout Friend the ability to stand through the whole ceremony. (grin)
- Your Scout Friends are done!
- Repeat for each child in the Den.

Tips:

If the picture supplied of the boy is not the correct size, the picture can be scanned and sized to the appropriate size.

The Paint program that is supplied with Windows works very well for this project.

Business Items – Yearly Planning

The way I approach yearly planning is to first of all come up with a plan that will get all the requirements for rank advancement done by the Blue and Gold banquet. I usually bring the assistant den leader in after I have

that completed. We'll fill in the extra things that we could do during the year. I always have a hike in the fall and spring at each rank level, each of them going a little longer. I try to plan one field trip per month. If possible I try to complete related requirements even if they are from a different section of the book.

At the Tiger, Wolf and Bear level I try to mix in a few elective during the early part of the year and then focus on them exclusively on them after the Blue and Gold. I get the parents involved in planning and running the elective. I also have one den meeting a month away from my house. I get the family who's hosting the den meeting to run portions of the den meeting.

At the Webelos and Arrow of Light level I have the den meeting exclusively at my house. I let the boys know the year plan early on so they understand how the activity pins that they're working on relate to the different goals. In the Webelos years, I try to have a backyard campout right after they cross over (June of the first year) and have a State Park campout the following summer along with Navajo. The following fall we attend the district camporee. I also try to get in some longer hikes. The historic hikes are great. The boys sometime lose interest in finding the answers but I think they remember it as the move on into Boy Scouts.

Don't Give Up

Walt Disney was turned down 302 times before he got financing for his dream of creating the "Happiest Place on Earth". Today, due to his persistence, millions of people have shared 'the joy of Disney'. Colonel Sanders spent two years driving across the United States looking for restaurants to buy his chicken recipe. He was turned down 1,009 times! How successful is Kentucky Fried Chicken today?

Having said this, keep in mind that you must constantly reevaluate your circumstances and the approach you are using to reach your goal. There is no sense in being persistent at something that you are doing incorrectly! Sometimes you have to modify your approach along the way. Every time you do something you learn from it, and therefore find a better way to do it the next time.

Don't Be Afraid to Fail

You've failed many times, although you may not remember. You fell down the first time you tried to walk. You almost drowned the first time you tried to swim, didn't you? Did you hit the ball the first time you swung a bat? Heavy hitters, the ones who hit the most home runs, also strike out a lot.

- R.H. Macy failed seven times before his store in New York caught on.
- English novelist John Creasey got 753 rejection slips before he published 564 books.
- Babe Ruth struck out 1,330 times, but he also hit 714 home runs.

Don't worry about failure. Worry about the chances you miss when you don't even try.

Dig a Little Deeper

There's a story about the California gold rush that tells of two brothers who sold all they had and went prospecting for gold. They discovered a vein of the shining ore, staked a claim, and proceeded to get down to the serious business of getting the gold ore out of the mine. All went well at first, but then a strange thing happened. The vein of gold ore disappeared! They had come to the end of the rainbow, and the pot of gold was no longer there. The brothers continued to pick away, but without success. Finally, they gave up in disgust.

They sold their equipment and claim rights for a few hundred dollars, and took the train back home. Now the man who bought the claim hired an engineer to examine the rock strata of the mine. The engineer advised him to continue digging in the same spot where the former owners had left off. And three feet deeper, the new owner struck gold.

A little more persistence and the two brothers would have been millionaires themselves. That's gold in you too. Do you need to dig three feet farther?
